Despite its cosmopolitan population, the BK faculty lacks a space for the diverse prayer, contemplative and de-stressing practices of students and staff.

The lack of such a space prevents members of our faculty from fully enjoying the experience of being a part of the faculty: those who pray regularly (such as Muslims); those with

neurodivergencies who require regular quiet-time; and anyone else who needs a space to quietly destress, do not feel that they can spend time at the faculty without a degree of discomfort.

The Burnout Society (Byung-Chul Han, 2015) posits that 'contemplative-attention' - including religious - will enable us to cope with the stresses of today's 'hyper-attention' society. However, our nearest contemplation room is a 20-minute walk away. Though our Dean supports our cause for a contemplation room at BK, matters have been slow-moving and hardly-discussed as a pertinent issue.

Therefore, to avert the problems of stress-related burnout and to accommodate the needs of religious and/ or neurodivergent members of our faculty, our aim is to build a temporary, pop-up contemplation room at our faculty. We hope to foster a conversation about the role of contemplation at our fast-paced faculty, and society at large.

6. Project plan

A temporary, pop-up contemplation room will be built in either rooms BG.West.370 or 02.West.610, or in the Oostserre or Modelhal (pending approval from the BK Expo committee) at BK. Its design (to be confirmed) will be informed by graduation thesis for which he is designing a permanent contemplation room at the faculty. The pop-up will also be a test-bed for design theorisations, particularly that a successful and inclusive contemplation room at our faculty should be flexible in its layout and furniture and without explicitly religious symbols.

Since part of the aim is to increase awareness of the need for contemplative space, we hope to publicise the pop-up throughout the faculty and to use the pop-up as an opportunity to exhibit the architectural history and theory of contemplation.

We will enlist a group of student volunteers from our faculty to facilitate the logistics of publicity, material handling and construction. We are hopeful that there will be enthusiastic volunteers and friends who will appreciate an experience in construction.

Outputs

The pop-up contemplation room will be a single-storey installation with a maximum footprint of 30m². It will accommodate activities such as meditation, religious prayer, quick naps and simply thinking and doing nothing. It will likely be either a corkbrick or a timber frame structure for ease of dismountability and flexibility of spatial reconfiguration during use.

Expected outcomes

We hope that the pop-up contemplation room allows religious and/ or neurodivergent faculty members to enjoy and spend time more comfortably at the faculty. At the very least, we expect that it will incite a wider discussion about the inclusions of the target audience so that the plan of having a permanent contemplation room is considered with greater urgency.

Impact

It is expected that the pop-up could alter the perception of the need to pray, contemplate, relax or self-reflect from being an outlandish activity to something commonplace for everyone so that we can cope with burnout.

SCHEDULE

Since and are graduation students, their academic schedules will be busy. Time will need to be carefully managed to ensure that the project does not fall behind schedule. All relevant parties will also need to be duly notified if anything changes.

CONSTRUCTION

There is a risk of our volunteers getting harmed during construction. As such, we aim to undergo construction safety training and enlist the help of professors who would be interested in guiding us for this. Part of our construction safety will require all volunteers to wear construction shoes, high-vis jackets and hard hats.

EXCLUSION

By calling this a contemplation pop-up, rather than a 'prayer' pop-up, we are mitigating the possibility that non-religious individuals will be excluded. Of course, the a-specificity of this pop-up functions mean that some people will no-doubt feel discomfort (e.g. Muslim women may not want to pray where there are also Muslim men praying), it is hoped that our pop-up can be big enough to accommodate spatial distance to minimise discomfort due to others also using the space. That said, we aim to treat whatever risks of exclusion we find in the pop-up as lessons for a permanent installation.

Pop-Up Contemplation Space is a Bouwkunde-based initiative which aims to create a temporary pop-up contemplation room. This would be a space where the contemplative practices of religious and/ or neurodivergent individuals are comfortably incorporated into their working day at the faculty. The broader aim is to popularise conversations about the role of contemplation, prayer and self-reflection in everyday life to include those who pray and contemplate regularly at our secular institution.
