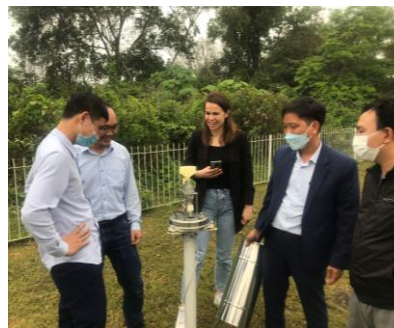


Editor's note

Thuyloi management and library visits

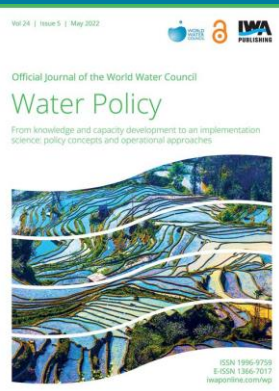

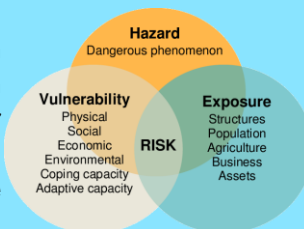
Utrecht conference Yee Mon and Afia

HUNRE fieldwork sites in Ninh Binh and Hoa Binh to be developed

In 2022, TU Delft will support the faculty of water resources of HUNRE to develop fieldwork practice sites for the water management curriculum. After an initial scouting sites in Ninh Binh and Hoa Binh provinces were chosen. In the coming months the sites will be developed, equipment will be prepared and experiments and coursework will be designed for the students.



World Bank publishes Climate and Development Report Vietnam

A new World Bank Group report proposes paths for Vietnam to address climate risks while sustaining robust economic growth. The World Bank Group's Country Climate and Development Report for Vietnam, published on July 1st, underscores the urgency of adaptation to climate change, combined with policies and public and private investments to reduce the carbon intensity of growth. From July 9th -14th OKP project partners Dr. Thom Bogaard, Lindsey Schwidder and Juliette Eulderink visited Vietnam. They worked with HUNRE on the development of the practice field sites for the water management curriculum.



Dr. Thom organized a workshop on innovative ways of monitoring water resources at both HUNRE and Thuyloi, explaining concepts such as tracer hydrology and eDNA.



Furthermore the project team met the new vice-rector of HUNRE, Ms. Trinh. The partners made exciting plans for the final project year with both universities and InNET, including trainings on landslides, management exchange trips and research collaborations in the Red River and Mekong deltas.

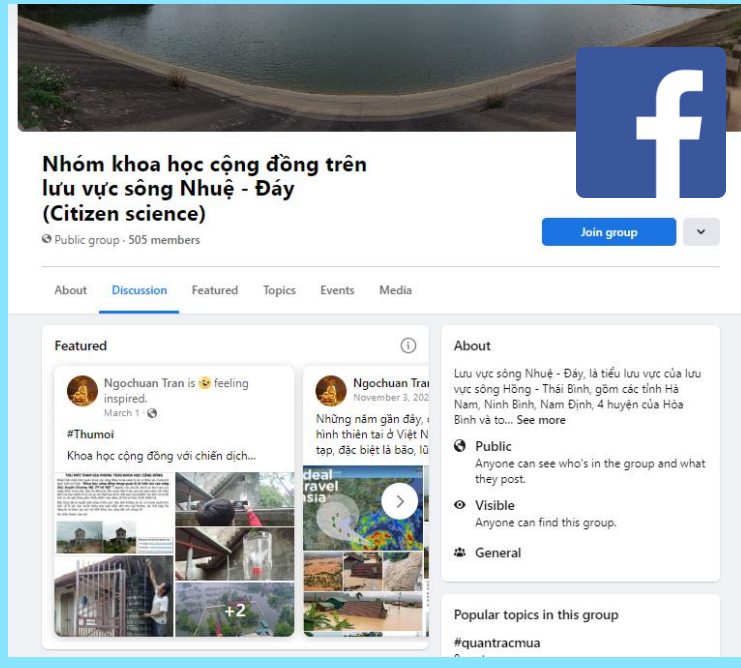
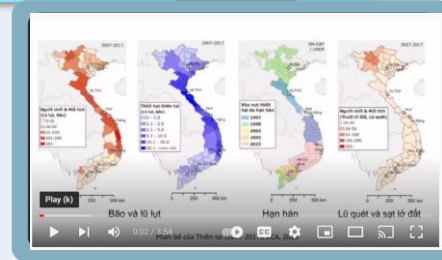
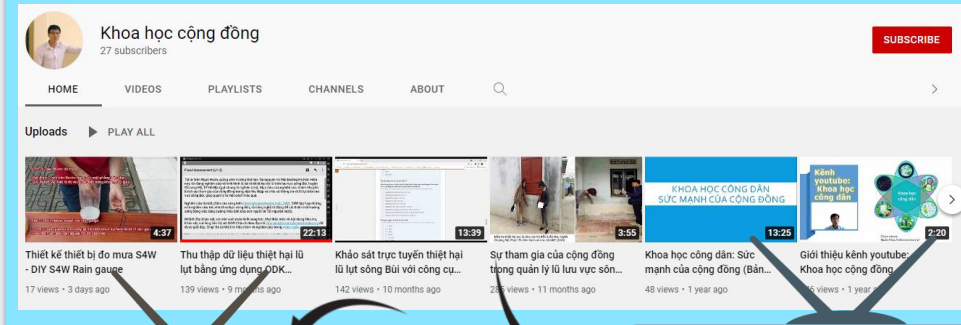
For his PhD research, Tran Ngoc Huan of HUNRE aims to use remote sensing, modeling in situ data in combination with citizen science data, to assess flood damages in the Bui River basin. He set up a Citizen Science campaign where citizens of his study area measure rainfall using plastic bottle rain gauges and the [SmartPhones4Water](#) app. He shares his methods, results and lessons learned on YouTube and Facebook. 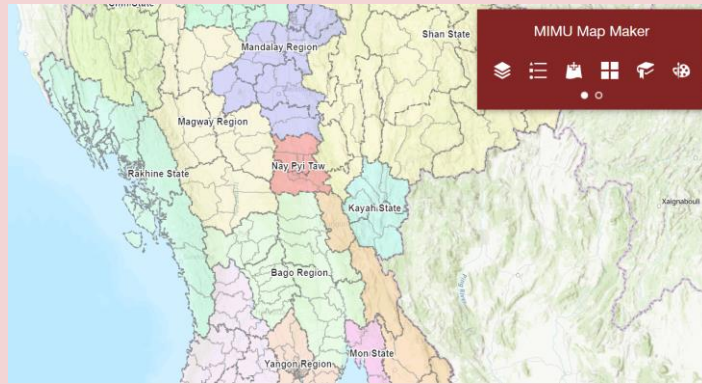
