
* Note that in the US/UK system, administration is a high-level term and has little to do with the Dutch "administratie".

RMAs in the 2010th: blended professional

- Non-scientific staff with academic background (often a PhD)
- Working on activities that fall partly into the core business of scientific staff
- Efficient and effective in their operations due to their blended profile
- Less frustration and reduced work pressures for both scientific staff and (other) RMAs, because both scientific staff and RMA focus their efforts on what they are really good at
